This course will examine the meaning and value of human life, the meaning and value of death, the possibility of "life after death", and the significance death should have for the living of one's life.

Course Requirements:

- •Class Participation (10% of grade): Based on quantity and quality of in-class participation. Effort counts. Attendance also counts. Each set will be worth 1% of your overall course grade. Take them seriously. They should be submitted, via e-mail (alex.guerrero@nyu.edu), by noon of the day that the reading will be discussed.
